- Petition for any necessary federal action (60 days after final EPMP): 10/12/2021 (Done but Ongoing)
- Remove all unoccupied marine debris: 10/15/2021 (Done but Ongoing)
- Finalize Environmental Protection and Management Plan: 12/15/2021 (Done on 8/12/21)
- No new vessels in Eelgrass Protection Zone (EPZ): 12/15/2021 (Ongoing)
- Install 15 20 moorings in anchor zone: 12/15/2022 (On Hold)
- Initiate eelgrass restoration studies: 12/31/2022 (Done)
- Remove all post 8/19 vessels: 10/15/2023 Extension Requested and Approved to 10/15/2024

- Begin implementation of 10-year adaptive management plan: 12/15/2023 (Notice to Proceed received 5/5/23. Plan will be submitted on 12/15/23)
- No vessels in EPZ: 10/15/2024 EPZ signage program has been initiated.
- Remove all occupied non-'Safe and Seaworthy': 10/15/2024. All vessels in this category have been provided a 12-month advance notice.
- > Apply for mooring permit from BCDC prior to the end date and if desired: 10/15/2026
- Remove all occupied 'Safe and Seaworthy': 10/15/2026
- Removing all vessels and occupants: 10/15/2026
- Only transient seaworthy vessels in anchor zone: 10/15/2026

VESSEL BUYBACK PROGRAM

PAST REPORTING PERIOD

- Approved by RBRA Board 6/23/22
 9 vessels surrendered, \$51,600 distributed
- Program terminated 12/31/22 Will be brought back with housing support program
- Program reinstated on 4/13/23 and will remain active to 10/15/26
- Enough funding over the next three years to buyback most all the vessels in the anchorage
- ➤ 3 vessels purchased since 4/13/23



ACTIVITIES DURING THIS REPORTING PERIOD

- 5 Vessels purchased and properly disposed of during this reporting period
- One floating home purchased and disposed of during this reporting period.
- ▶ 8 total vessels purchased and properly disposed of since the reinstatement of the program since 4/13/23
- \$39,700 distributed since reinstatement of program
- ➤ \$81,700 distributed and 21 vessels properly disposed of since program inception in 2022

RE: Petition for Rulemaking to Amend Anchorage Boundaries within the Richardson Bay Special Anchorage Area

Dear Mr. McGrath,

This is a follow up to my letter dated February 1, 2023 regarding Coast Guard District Eleven's response to your petition for rulemaking requesting amending the Richardson Bay Special Anchorage Area, 33 CFR § 110.126a.

A Navigation Safety Risk Assessment was conducted to determine whether there is a need to amend the Richardson Bay Special Anchorage. The results of this analysis suggest that there are no navigational or environmental factors that would necessitate changes to the anchorages from a federal perspective.

Per 33 CFR § 110.126a, the Coast Guard authority for operational management is delegated to the Richardson Bay Regional Authority and the County of Marin. This specifically allows management of the Special Anchorage Area by local authorities to establish requirements on matters including the anchorage of vessels, placement of moorings, and use of anchored and moored vessels within the special anchorage area.

LEGAL OPINION

On December 1. 2023 Judge William H
Orrick provided an order to dismiss
without leave to amend, a claim against
RBRA with language that supports
RBRA's position and codes regarding
Richardson Bay.

When CFR 33.110.126(a) was identified, the Judge opined the following



> Defendants also contend that throughout the FAC argues or implies that RBRA's anchorage ordinance is preempted by federal law. See, e.g., FAC ¶ 145 ("anchoring permit application violates the Supremacy Clause because it effectively bans all anchoring within the federally designated anchorage outlines in 33 C.F.R. 110.126(a)"). I agree that no regulation or federal authority identified by preempts the authority of RBRA to control anchorages in Richardson's Bay. Instead, the federal regulations he identified establish Richardson's Bay as a "special anchorage area" and direct mariners to comply with the RBRA's Permit Scheme. Significantly, the Ninth Circuit has expressly rejected the argument that the special anchorage designations conflict with local ordinances requiring permits to stay beyond 72 hours.

LEGAL OPINION, CONTINUED

Although this opinion is still subject to appeal, it mentions more than once, regarding anchoring and living aboard on Richardson Bay.



- ➤ But I agree that to the extent is alleging a standalone constitutional entitlement to anchor where he chooses, the United States' constitution does not confer a blanket right to anchor in Richardson's Bay. See Graf v. San Diego Unified Port Dist., 7 Cal. App. 4th 1224, 1232 (1992) ("Boaters do not have a constitutional right to unregulated long-term anchorage in public navigable waters.").
- Defendants argue that a procedural due process claim because he has not applied for a Permit (Mot. at 8-9) and admits that he intends to live on his boat in Richardson's Bay, which is not allowed under RBRA Code §3.04.020 and means that he would be denied a Permit. See Mot. at 8-9; RBRA Code 3.04.020 ("Living aboard a houseboat or vessel anchored or moored in Richardson's Bay is prohibited."

EPA Restoration Grant

- Reminder: \$2.8 million from US EPA's SF Bay Water Quality Improvement Fund awarded to RBRA 5/5/23. Funds:
 - Restoration and Adaptive Management Plan (RAMP) due to BCDC by 12/15/23
 - ➤ 15 acres of eelgrass restoration by 2027
 - Ongoing adaptive management
 - Significant partner engagement/stakeholder outreach
- Award for consultant services executed 9/14/23 with Coastal Policy Solutions and Merkel & Associates
 - Services include project management, stakeholder engagement, policy support, and eelgrass restoration
- In process: subawards to project partners SFSU Estuary & Ocean Science Center and Audubon California





Restoration and Adaptive Management Plan (RAMP)


- On track for submittal to BCDC on 12/15/23
- > Technical document:
 - Describes 10-year adaptive management plan for restoration of 75 acres of eelgrass in RB
 - Consistent with SF Bay Plan, RBRA Special Area Plan,
 California Eelgrass Mitigation Policy (CEMP)
 - Considers beneficial reuse of dredge sediment
 - Accounts for passive and active restoration of anchor scars
 - ➤ Builds on results of ongoing restoration studies described at 8/23/23 BCDC Enforcement Committee meeting
- May be periodically updated in accordance with adaptive management and monitoring results






2023 MONITORING UPDATE

- Presented by Coastal Policy Solutions to public and RBRA Board of Directors on 11/16/23
- > Includes:
 - 1. 2022 Sidescan Sonar Survey
 - 2. 2022 and 2023 Damage Surveys
 - 3. 2022/2023 Waterbird Monitoring
 - 4. Major Takeaways





- Method: boat-based sonar
- Survey completed by Merkel and Associates
- > Same general pattern of eelgrass cover in RB as previous years
 - Core of bed in central bay
 - Present but less dense in shallows (warmer), some evidence of wasting disease
 - Absent from deeper parts of the bay (approx. 5 feet MLLW), consistent with light limits









- Total acres: 956.5 acres
- > Cover class: how dense the eelgrass bed is. Proxy for health.
- Less than half in 40-100% cover class, over 25% in the <5% cover class</p>

TOTAL ACRES OF EELGRASS IN RICHARDSON BAY






- ➤ Binary change 2019 vs 2022:
 - > 13% increase
 - ➤ Within normal bed variability





- Closer look 2019 vs 2022:
 - Some areas of expansion
 - Some areas of decline
- Likely causes of declines
 - Northern reaches: thermal stress
 - ➤ Loss in core: eelgrass wasting disease





- ➤ Biggest change: decline 2009 → 2013
- Absolute cover: variable but generally increasing over the past 20 years
 - 20 years is NOT very long in the context of an eelgrass bed
- > 100% cover equivalency:
 - Definition: area that would be covered if all present eelgrass was at 100% cover
 - Less dramatic increase since 2003
 - Declined by 24.2% between 2019-2022
 - Better indicator of bed health
 - Beneficial when evaluating:
 - Eelgrass bed productivity
 - Biomass
 - Other metrics dependent on plant density, (e.g., carbon cycling and storage)





2023 MONITORING UPDATE: 2. DAMAGE ASSESSMENTS

- Method: aerial photography and GIS analysis
 - Photos by 111th Aerial Photography Group
 - Analysis and report by Audubon CA
- ➤ Goal: How much eelgrass is damaged by anchor scour? Does eelgrass recover within an anchor scar?
- ➤ Scour damage from anchors, chains, other ground tackle
- ➤ Methods repeated from previous study (Kelly et al. 2019)
- Low and high damage estimates



- > 2022 survey:
 - Assessment influenced by area of unknown damage, suspected harmful algal bloom








- > 2023 survey:
 - Assessment not possible due to macroalgal mat obscuring the eelgrass bed from view






- Additional findings:
 - Some, but not all, anchor scars show signs of recovery
 - Suggests recovery takes more than one year




















2023 MONITORING UPDATE: 3. WATERBIRD MONITORING



> Results:

Continue to see rafts primarily along northern and eastern shorelines, same as previous years.








2023 MONITORING UPDATE MAJOR TAKEAWAYS

- > The good:
 - Damage to eelgrass from anchor scour appears to have plateaued
 - Continue to see evidence of eelgrass recovery
- > The not so good:
 - Overall health of the bed is questionable
 - Thermal stress, wasting disease, algal competition all expected to increase with climate change
- Overall:
 - Protecting and restoring this bed is more crucial than ever




